NEWS

- Dementia Awareness Training in Undergraduate Healthcare Curricula. The National Institute for Health Research Collaboration for Leadership in Applied Health Research Care (NIHR CLAHRC) in the South West (PenCLAHRC) has been commissioned by Health Education South West to undertake a project 'Empirical development of Curricula Standards and Principles to support Dementia Education'. It aims to produce a simple set of high-level standards to be used by educational commissioners across the full range of their commissioned programmes. The project is seeking expert opinion by a Delphi consultation process to gain consensus on these standards and criteria. This is an important opportunity to highlight the essential interprofessional aspects for the education and training of both undergraduates and postgraduate professionals.
- Online interprofessional Emergency Department learning resources must clearly demonstrate value. A recent study exploring the value of technology to stimulate interprofessional discussion and education found that emergency department (ED) professionals were sceptical of efforts to use technology to enhance interprofessional education. The authors concluded that introducing online resources in the ED to support IPE and discussion should be viewed with caution. New opportunities must fill a clearly defined need, be value-added, and enhance clinical practice through consolidating and simplifying existing resources. Creating a collaborative website to improve process and function may lead to a future interactive resource for shared learning across professions. - Despite Known Link Between Poor Teamwork and Errors, Only 30% of Medical Schools in the USA Provide Teamwork Training. A report from the Institute of Medicine http://www.nap.edu/openbook.php?isbn=0309087236 cites that healthcare disciplines have inhibited teamwork and collaboration by healthcare professionals, but unfortunately only about 30 percent of medical schools are trying to fix the poor teamwork cited in the study. Despite the spread of these programs, Dr. Barbara Brandt, the Director of the National Center for Interprofessional Practice and Education, says interprofessional programs are still in "relative infancy" with implementations in only approximately 30 percent of medical schools. Dr. Brandt expects nearly every medical school to have some form of team-based curriculum in the next few years. She stated that what is promising is the new emphasis on research and effectiveness in team based training and care.
- Survey reveals managers' concerns about integrating health and care. Moves to integrate health and social care are regarded by many to be the turnkey solution to take the pressure off our healthcare system. It was somewhat concerning that in spite of the case being made for integration, in the latest survey of Institute of Healthcare Management (IHM) members, more than half said they didn't believe that integrated care would take the pressure off the NHS.
