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It's About Leadership

One of the early critical success factors identified by the National Center is the importance of engaged senior leadership to support IPE. These days, more than ever, bold leadership is required in order to advance our work. Several Nexus Summit 2017 sessions are designed with the critical role of leadership in mind. Mary Jo Kreitzer, PhD, RN, FAAN, Founding Director of the Earl E. Bakken Center for Spirituality and Healing will present a workshop on Wellbeing and Resilience for Health Professionals. The workshop will address many of the organizational components that enhance the wellbeing of teams, workplaces and communities. For those interested in advancing the Quadruple Aim and the importance of wellbeing and resilience for students, residents or clinicians, this is a unique opportunity to engage with a world-renowned leader in integrative health. Mary Jo will also be the featured speaker for the Monday lunch presentation to discuss work-related stress in the health professions and the importance of systems and cultures as a way to improve health, wellbeing and resilience.

On Monday, we are happy to have Lewis Sandy, MD, FACP, Executive Vice President, Clinical Advancement at United Health Group will present an up-to-the-minute keynote on what is important in these turbulent times: <u>True North: Advancing Interprofessional Practice and</u>

Education in Turbulent Times. Hint: It involves teams! At UnitedHealth Group, he focuses on clinical innovation, payment/delivery reforms to modernize the US health care system and physician collaboration. This will be a unique opportunity to hear from a leader in the industry about payment systems and healthcare policy. For background, in 2016 Dr. Sandy and Barbara Brandt were part of a panel discussing <u>The Role of Interprofessional</u> <u>Collaboration in Transforming Health Care Delivery</u>.

On Tuesday morning, an important panel discussion will take place with Stephanie Gardner, PharmD, EdD, Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and Provost University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences; Pete Vlasses, PharmD, DSc, Executive Director Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education; and Warren Newton, MD, MPH, North Carolina Area Health Education Centers Program Vice Dean, University of North Carolina School of Medicine called <u>The Provocateur Perspective: Why Bold Leadership is Required in a Changing</u> <u>Landscape</u>. The three members of the panel have unique perspectives on how uncertainty in healthcare policy and education will directly impact their work at both the state and national level – and all three are not hesitant to address a challenge and speak their mind.



An investigation to understand and evaluate the best ways to educate for and promote integrated working across the health and care sectors

A recent project, commissioned by Health Education England (HEE), designed to promote understanding and evaluate the best ways to educate for, and promote integrated working across the health and care sectors, is now available on HEE West Midlands Learning http://learning.wm.hee.nhs.uk/node/909. The investigation is set against an international literature review and incorporates formal and informal, pre-registration and postregistration/CPD education and training spanning both the future and existing health and social care workforce. The report uses primary research findings from a range of staff in nine higher education institutions (HEIs), and managers and practitioners in nine service settings delivering integrated care across the West Midlands.

Findings suggest that all nine HEIs are making efforts to foster the skills, attributes and capabilities in their students to prepare them for working in integrated care settings, usually through interprofessional education (IPE) initiatives. However, in some instances, the language of integrated care has yet to permeate curricula to any great extent, and generally links to social work colleagues could be stronger. Where access to a wide range of professions is limited there is reliance on students meeting those professionals and learning more about them on placement. However, placements are predominantly profession–specific, indicating a need to rethink placement strategies to offer a wider experience and possibly considering the scoping of third sector organisations.

Insight from the nine service settings shows that education and training of the existing workforce is treated with importance, although in places funding can be limited. In general, staff display a strong commitment to lifelong learning. New staff are inducted and receive ongoing training in post. External training is at times necessary but in-service provision is the backbone of this continuing training. However, there is also wide acknowledgment of the informal learning which occurs as part of the daily routine due to the richness of

expertise in integrated teams. Those staff that are well established are more likely to have progressed to a high degree of integration through cross training, which allows staff to cover for one another to provide a basic, fast and efficient service. Team training is highlighted as being crucial to promoting change, much as it is considered important to educating the future workforce through IPE initiatives. Aside from advocating that services and HEIs would benefit from working more closely together to train both the future and existing workforce, a range of recommendations are made for integrated care services, HEIs, professional and statutory review bodies and Health Education England.

The John Horder Award 2017

Title: Fantastic Foxes Training Hub: Saffron Health cascade interprofessional values through engagement with interprofessional Education

We were honoured to receive the John Horder practice award at the council chambers at Kings College in London on 14th June. Attending such a prestigious location to collect the award was a contrast to the site in which we both practice as GPs, in an area of higher deprivation in inner city Leicester. We identified with the work of Lord Victor Adebowale which he described in his lecture on supporting the vulnerable, which seemed particularly relevant to our practice population and ethos (we work alongside Turning point helping patients with substance misuse). This issue was also brought into stark relief as events unfolded with the terrible fire at Grenfell tower that day.

We recognise that achieving this award was a truly collaborative effort and would not have happened without the help of the wider surgery team, as well as colleagues at the University of Leicester Medical School and De Montfort University School of Pharmacy. It was noted that the assistance given by Professor Elizabeth Anderson, Dr Neena Lakhani and Dr Jenny Ford was invaluable, who were present at the event.

The Fantastic Foxes training hub has energised local education through an initiative to train local educators in Inter Professional Education (IPE). Initially the Saffron Practice had little experience of embracing the values of IPE. To address this the GP's and practice staff attended a Master Class session at the University of Leicester on IPE facilitated by Professor Elizabeth Anderson and Dr Jenny Ford. This cascaded into a rolling programme for all the Spoke practices and between the summer from 2015–2017 a total of 58 practitioners (n=30 GP's; n=7 Nurses; n=21 other, including clinical pharmacists, social workers, managers etc.) completed the half-day course. The outcome showed that none of these NHS staff had any in-depth understanding about IPE values and led to some new insights not just into how to organise teaching for learning but also in how to manage all practice-team-based activities

Armed with these new understandings energy flowed to establish more community-based IPE events and pilots within the Saffron Group Practice.

- 1. Substance Misuse IPE Pilot: Undergraduate students from medicine and nursing together met and interviewed two patients being treated for opioid addiction. They then attended and presented and discussed their findings with the regular multidisciplinary drug team (range of specialities from mental health, social care, voluntary sector and healthcare). Interprofessional learning for the MDT included a discussion about services available to veterans.
- 2. Polypharmacy IPE: Interprofessional learning with undergraduate medical and pharmacy students where joint home visits enabled the students to assess the complex prescriptions of patients and feedback to the practice. This events has had a positive impact on patient care where drug errors have been identified and changes made and has become an embedded part of the curriculum for both sets of students. This pilot has now been embedded into City Academy medical student and pharmacy student curriculum and 120 students have attended 1.5 day IPE polypharmacy module. The results were presented at the All Together Better Health Conference by Dr Chris Sanders and Dr Neena Lakhani. The work is now being fully evaluated as it has spread across the regions teaching Academies. Students now
- 3. In-house practice IPE has filtered into practice meetings. Learning about different professional understandings of issues helps primary care clinician appreciate different aspects of patient care and different professional approaches. Practices have developed educational meetings along interprofessional lines including safeguarding / cause for concern, palliative care and significant event meetings. An

example would be the selection of three significant events discussed in groups of 8 which included receptionists, nurses and medical staff. Issues raised were discussed as a primary care team and key action points implemented.

The Foxes training hub has been successful regionally in exporting IPE initiative through training local educators in IPE through educator conferences and influencing Health Education Across the East Midlands to introduce IPE as a key performance indicator for other Community Educator Provider Networks (CEPNs) or training hubs.

Looking forward, this award will enable us to expand our future IPE work in Leicester involving an increasing range of disciplines and professional level, including physicians assistants and pre-registration pharmacists placed in primary care.

Finally, we dedicate this award to Dr Adrian Hastings, who was an inspirational GP and educator at Saffron and the University of Leicester.

communities is central to the future NHS because these perspectives are fundamental – patients are why the NHS exists. The NHS five year forward view (Forward View) is unequivocal about this (NHS England et al 2014).

What helps to build collaborative relationships among health and care professionals, patients, service users, carers and communities?

This guide is a response to that question. It stems from an evolving body of our work focused on exploring and supporting shared leadership. A growing number of mental health providers (in the UK and beyond) are beginning to embed quality improvement across their organisations, with some encouraging results. Call for hosting the ATBH Conference in 2020

The need to be prepared to carry full financial liability for the conference, and organize the conference according to the general guidelines and the general program schedule, over 3 days in the period to define between May and October 2020 and to be agreed with the WCC-ATBH. They need to provide an easily accessible venue for international participation with evidence of available accommodation for a minimum of 500 delegates over 3 days in the conference venue. Preferably they have a track record in interprofessional education and collaborative practice nationally and internationally. Candidates provide written support from senior managers of the organisation/s involved in the bid, and provide evidence of available accommodation for lodging of conference participants in the area around the conference venue. 
