- PRESS RELEASE Implications for interprofessional learning and working must be addressed says CAIPE, in plans to integrate care The Centre for the Advancement of Interprofessional Education (CAIPE) welcomes the announcement by the Department of Health that twelve of the leading national organisations in the health and care sector have given their commitment to local area integration. Working together in a "joined up system" requires effective integration and collaboration not only between services but also between professions if person centred co-ordinated care is to be achieved. CAIPE emphasises the need for all health and social care professionals to learn together for effective collaborative practice. Interprofessional learning opportunities enable staff to work together in a spirit of give and take in response to change. Many people have placed great faith in the idea that integrated care can solve some of the most pernicious health issues of our time. With an ageing population and a dramatic increase in long-term conditions, it's easy to see why co-ordinated care for patients could provide better health, care and value. However, it's easy to confuse structural integration with what patients really want personalised, high-quality, seamless care focused on their needs.
