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Message from The Chair:

Dear CAIPE Members

Hoping you are all keeping well and safe as we hopefully are on the journey out of lockdown that has continued to impact on all of us, not least CAIPE in new ways of collaborative working.

I'm pleased to announce that CAIPE Board have appointed Co Chairs of CAIPE, Professor Elizabeth Anderson, University of Leicester and Dr Angela Lennox, General Practitioner.

Professor Elizabeth Anderson has advanced pedagogical understanding of IPE, practice-based interprofessional learning, interprofessional collaboration (ICP) and faculty development for IPE. Her academic interests are service user and carer co-production, patient safety and interprofessional simulation. She is currently working as a CAIPE Fellow on interprofessional leadership. Liz has previously been a CAIPE Board member.

Dr Angela Lennox is a GP who in 1995 developed Prince Philip House in Leicester as one of the first pioneering multi-professional Health Care Centres in the UK. She has worked in the Department of Health, NHS and with various government departments and was awarded an MBE and later a CBE for services to medicine and the community. Angela has engaged with CAIPE many times over the past few years.

I'm sure you will all join me in congratulating Angela and Liz on their appointment of Co Chairs which will bring a new venture to CAIPE in its vision, development, promotion, research, management, leadership and sustainability of interprofessional education and collaborative practice. Liz and Angela have commenced the process of shadowing me to ensure ease of transition from current Chair to new Co Chairs and will formally take up the position of CAIPE Co Chairs in July 2021.

CAIPE activity continues during lockdown and we have the virtual CAIPE Regional Forum hosted by Aston University 'IPE in a pandemic: sustainable innovations', 10.00 to 16.00, Friday 19 March 2021. Details of how to register are below.

We have also opened the call for applications for the John Horder 2021 Team and pre-registration Student Awards. If you are working in General Practice, Primary, Community or Social Care or have Departments of General Practice and Primary Care in your institutions please promote this opportunity to submit applications for the John Horder Award and more details can be found below.

Sadly, due to the continued impact of the pandemic the decision to cancel the KCL/CAIPE conference in June 2020 has been reached with the expectation that the it goes ahead as a face-to-face event in 2022. GUEST EDITORIAL

One year on. Where are we now? As the pandemic continues to unfold with tragic consequences, lessons learned from its impact and reflecting on the approaches that have failed or been successful are now even more essential. Silo working and individualistic approaches continue to be modelled by various governments and leaders around the world, with arguments and policies that strengthen their own agendas, with suffering and loss continuing. As communities bear an

unequal burden, we see the consequences of profound inequality and of cuts to public health.

So, we do what we can to counter this in our sphere of influence and in our health and social care teams. We know that entrenched hierarchy and lack of accountability in health and socialcare causes many harms. We also know how difficult it is to establish programmes of teaching and learning and indeed organisational change to combat this, in a sustainable way. How best to tackle this ongoing challenge when teams are under huge pressure? Health and social care teams are exhausted and are also suffering from the increased burden of COVID-19 disease, exacerbated by already stretched resources and often inadequate PPE.

The health needs of our teams must come to the fore. Daily debriefs/huddles and checking in with each other and ourselves becomes essential. As much learning and interaction becomes virtual, connecting with others and attending to our own health becomes more important, as does role modelling this to our students and junior colleagues. As I write this editorial, battling with worsening long Covid that has forced me to pause clinical work, I feel frustrated that I am not continuing to help with the ongoing effort to provide health and social care at this time of great need. Taking regular rests and learning to pace, I know I am not alone in my frustration. It is clearer than ever to me that we need to recognise those that may need to change roles and work differently due to illness such as long Covid. Similarly, we must support those that have responsibilities such as caring for family members and looking after children. We know the perils of multitasking though having to home school and work from home involves just that. Being kind to ourselves and doing what we can - being 'good enough' - is sometimes what we have to learn through acceptance of where we are in life's journey professionally and personally.

As the buds form on the trees and birdsong and sunlight fills the garden, I reflect that there are beacons of hope from those that do things differently and collaborate with a spirit of collectivism that CAIPE embodies. Proving again that necessity is often the hand of change, teams have evolved and changed their working patterns and approach. As Richard Gray and I discussed in our collaborative piece for the COVID-19 edition of JIC, Inter-Professional Education has never been more important for health and social care teams as now. Having never achieved a publication before, I was (and am) so grateful to Richard for his hard work and support in going through the submission and peer review process. My respect for those who do this regularly increased greatly. This experience also made me reflect on CAIPE's strength in the breadth of experience and variety of roles in its Board members, fellows and membership. The research working group has also done such great work in providing support for those wanting to publish but needing help from a collaborator.

Another piece of work that has flourished under the careful and attentive gaze of Richard Gray, working alongside Richard Pitt and the awards working group, is the John Horder Award. Working across organisations with the Royal Society of Medicine to co-facilitate the managing of the process has been another notable achievement, and last year there were the most submissions across all categories. The virtual presentation was a great success and we must be grateful to our great administrator Emma Beal who, as ever, worked so hard behind the scenes to make this happen. I was struck by the quality and variety of submissions, so much so, we decided to have runners up presentations and prizes too. The experience of being a part of this process for me re-established both the history of CAIPE and the man behind its inception, alongside the achievement of having last year's award conducted entirely remotely.

Just as technology has been essential for remote presentations, I have also found great value in the virtual long Covid support group I have joined through the charity Doctors in Distress. It seems we are just beginning to realise the magnitude of need for support for patients and staff affected by COVID-19.

Although there are strengths of uniprofessional groups in terms of having a wider community of practice and shared identity, I reflect that these groups could well benefit from being interdisciplinary and also based around IPE concepts. My practice has successfully introduced a group consultation model for long COVID. I was fortunate to co-facilitate one of these groups before needing to take sick leave myself. The synergy from the non-medical facilitator and health care professional is great to experience, as is the fostering of peer support, especially for a condition surrounded by such uncertainty and evolving symptoms and research. This experience of learning about, with and from fellow patients who are often experts by experience also reinforces the huge benefit from sharing our stories. I reflect too on the great digital storytelling workshops that CAIPE has commissioned in the past. Working with Pip and Tony from patient stories to tell our own narrative of working within the field of IPE is an experience I will always cherish and really underlined the spirit of collaborative working.

The vaccination programme has also been undertaken with a sense of pulling together and making it work. Staff at all levels have stepped out of their roles and learned new skills, doing what's needed to deliver vaccines in an often time pressurised way; our practice manager made phone calls at 10pm on a Friday to get the practice team underway at 6am the next morning and phone 1000 patients to attend that weekend. When door handles to consulting rooms rattle as they are disinfected mid-morning, we also reflect that the cleaning staff have never been so valuable. Making this work sustainably resourced is the next challenge.

Looking forward, we also welcome the appointments of CAIPE co-chairs Prof Liz Anderson and Dr Angela Lennox CBE DL. Liz and Angela bring a wealth of experience and also the professional links, authenticity and authority that will be of great benefit to the organisation. The role of Chair of CAIPE has grown immeasurably. It now seems a natural progression for this to form around a collaboration from co-chairs. Liz and Angela are celebrated leaders in their academic and health service fields. They also have wide portfolios with research, charity sector, student and patient group involvement, the benefits of which cannot be overstated. I congratulate them on their appointment.



INTERPROFESSIONAL EDUCATION HANDBOOK

We are pleased to announce the publication of '**The Interprofessional Education Handbook'** an essential read for those developing IPE in Practice.



Most Interprofessional working has traditionally taken place internally within health care including the integration of professionals working within primary, secondary and tertiary care. However, currently with increasing pressures of demand, particularly due to an aging population There is renewed emphasis on the need for external integration across sectors involving adult social care and third sector organisations (Clouder et al., 2017).

The Centre for the Advancement of Interprofessional Education (CAIPE) is a UK based charity which is a national and global leader in promoting and developing interprofessional education and learning with the purpose of improving collaborative practice, patient safety and quality of care. CAIPE understands interprofessional and collaborative practice to mean professionals from different disciplines working jointly across health and social care and beyond. IPE is one approach to achieve this, designed to equip professionals with the relevant knowledge skills and values required to enable this to happen (Lindqvist et al., 2017).

This Handbook has been developed by CAIPE as a resource to support educators and practitioners from any profession, who are interested in developing and delivering education interprofessionally. It should be read alongside the CAIPE interprofessional Guidelines (CAIPE, 2017).

To effectively implement an interprofessional education intervention it is necessary to ensure a common understanding of the principles of IPE, involve all relevant stakeholders in the curriculum design and consider the preparation and support of facilitators.






