It has been over 25 years since the first social media platform made its presence on the world wide web. It has become part of our everyday life like advertisements on the television, newspapers, and magazines. As humans, we are drawn to social media by our innate curiosity of current events. As researchers, academics and clinicians, we are increasing drawn to these virtual spaces for scholarly and informative purposes. We have found it to be an effective way to recruit participants, externally engage in likeminded colleagues in our own fields, or even as a general source for data and information. In essence, social media has revolutionised communication between practitioners, academics and researchers.

When social media initially appeared, it was a personal and individual experience. Individuals were autonomous in who, what, where and when they wanted to engage online. Today social media engagement has transformed into a large outlet for professional networking and research. With this, new challenges with ethical principles, which are normally familiar and easy to navigate, a forest full of boundaries to navigate. Old ethical issues such as consent, confidentiality and conflicts of interest remain (Reamer 2013) and new ethical, both political and global questions are emerging around issues of power, social justice, inequality, bias and culturalism Mishna et al., 2012). While these ethical issues with online mediums have been identified, there is still a struggle on how best to address them (Mishna et al., 2012). CAIPE's Communications and Marketing team endeavours to address these concerns the development of our online ethical guidelines for social media use and social media policy for our board members and members alike. However, through ongoing education, reflection, we can all earn to safely link our knowledge between discourses that underpin our daily practices such as professionalism in social media created spaces. In doing so, this will allow us as clinicians, academics and researchers to retain our commitment to ethical values and academic integrity.



NACIC2021 - Call for papers open until Monday, 31 May!



The 1st North American Conference on Integrated Care in association with the 6th World Congress on Integrated Care will be run as a virtual conference in partnership with the University of Toronto, KPMG Canada, HSPN, and iCOACH from 4 – 7 October 2021. With the overarching theme 'Codesigning for health and wellbeing with individuals and communities', the conference will bring together leaders, researchers, clinicians, managers, citizens, patients, and caregivers from around the world, who are engaged in the design and delivery of integrated health and social care. The conference is designed as a space for continued learning and collaboration and as an opportunity to exchange knowledge and grow connections with colleagues internationally.



NACIC2021 is co-designed with patients and caregivers and achieves Patients Included designation.

As NACIC2021 is a virtual offering, presenters will be asked to pre-record their content. The conference will make those recordings available to delegates to access in their own time and will be posted to the IFIC Knowledge Tree after the conference to be accessed by a wider audience. Abstract Submission

The strategic advisory and scientific committee for this conference has been established from North America and international experts who are leading in the field of Integrated Care. They are now accepting paper submissions on research, policy, practice, or education and specifically relating to the <u>Conference Themes</u> and the <u>9 Pillars of Integrated Care</u> until **Monday, 31 May**. The full abstract should be limited to 500 words. All accepted abstracts will be published in the <u>International Journal of Integrated Care</u> (Impact Factor 2.753) and recordings of presentations and workshops and all digital posters will be connected to the <u>Knowledge Tree</u>. Abstract Submission Guidelines are available to download below.

Each abstract submitter is asked to choose one of the Conference Themes and which of the 9 pillars that their paper is most relevant to, understanding there will be overlap. Today The King's Fund <u>publishes a new report</u> highlighting the potential role of place-based partnerships in improving health and wellbeing and considering how these opportunities can be realised.

The report sets out a series of principles to help guide local health and care leaders in these efforts and explores how each principle can be applied, with examples of how they are being put into practice.

A key conclusion of the report is that, as integrated care systems (ICS) move onto a more formal footing with legislation expected imminently, they will need to build up from their constituent places. ICSs should support the development of local place-based partnerships, ensuring they are adequately represented in formal ICS structures and strengthening connections between partners at all levels.
