Message from The Chair:

Dear CAIPE Members

Well, what a strange and challenging year this has been, not only for those of us in the UK but globally! CAIPE members last opportunity to meet face-to-face was back in March when we had the wonderful CAIPE Regional Forum hosted by the University of East Anglia, Norwich which was preceded by a CAIPE Board meeting. Many thanks to Prof Susanne Linqvist and team for hosting and guiding some of us to the cultural experience of historic Norwich. 

It's been almost a year since PROCare4Life started, and what a year! Throughout this first year, and despite all the challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic brought, the consortium was able to successfully achieve very interesting results.

We built the <u>PROCare4Life</u> website and created our social media accounts on <u>twitter</u> and <u>facebook</u> to ensure all our excellent project was being shown off to the world. We conducted research on users' needs and requirements with interviews, workshops and online surveys carried out that allowed us to gather feedback from 217 people. This approach ensures a user-centred solution with the first functional PROCare4Life prototype being installed and tested soon in all scenarios namely at home, in rehabilitation and in daycare facilities. These will be rolled out in the <u>project pilot sites</u> of Spain led by Association Parkinson Madrid (<u>APM</u>), Italy guided by Casa di Cura del Policnico

(<u>CCPP</u>), Germany directed by Wohlfahrtswerk für Baden-Württemberg (<u>WBW</u>), Portugal by Campus Neurológico Sénior (<u>CNS</u>) and Romania led by University of Medicine and Pharmacy "Carol Davila" Bucharest (<u>UMFCD</u>) and The University Emergency Hospital Bucharest (<u>UHB</u>)

With the implementation of this first prototype, currently being approved by the ethics committees of pilot sites, even more patients, caregivers and professionals are being recruited and involved to make sure their voices are heard and are at the heart of the design and implementation of the PROCare4Life project.


PROCare4Life animation series in the making!

Surveys aimed at gathering quantifiable data from Parkinson's, Alzheimer's and dementia patients launched



The <u>Association Parkinson Madrid</u> and the PROCare4Life Consortium created 2 online surveys. These were aimed at gathering quantifiable data from Parkinson's, Alzheimer's and dementia patients and their formal or informal caregivers, regarding the dynamic interplay between their daily life habits, needs and/or behaviours and issues that could influence their health, well-being and quality of life to inform ICT systems.

The anonymous surveys, collected information from existing end users' from a variety of social and health European systems with different cultural backgrounds and are available in the following languages: English; German; Italian; Portuguese; Romanian and Spanish. PROCare4Life telematics Interviews and Workshops



A transversal qualitative research for rich data collection, through interviews and workshops, was first planned to be carried out through face-to-face interactions in this phase of the project, *WP2-User, System and Ethical Considerations*. But because of Covid-19 situation, the <u>PROCare4Life</u> <u>Consortium</u> tried to adapt to the current reality and researchers have re-designed their qualitative methods taking into account existing social-distancing measures.

The beginning of this research had to be postponed during the peak of the pandemic during months 3 to 5 of the project, to not put participants under any additional unnecessary stress. Also, after some internal discussions among partners, the Consortium decided to virtually replicate the interviews with the use of phone calls and video-calling software (e.g. Skype/Zoom).

By doing this, all partners had to inform their ethics committees about the modifications in the method of data collection with the health and wellbeing of our participants and researchers taking priority over research and project timelines.

In this sense and in this context, from June to August 2020, the PROCare4Life team and more specifically APM, CCPP, CNS, KIN, MU, UMF and WBW partners conducted **40 interviews** Read More

Integrated Care and COVID19 - the role of technology to bring us together

Director of Communications at the International Foundation for Integrated Care, Fiona Lyne asks can we go back to handshakes and hugs?

For many years we listened to anecdotes suggesting that rather than bringing us together, technology actually drives us apart. With children and indeed adults glued to handheld technology intimating that while we were in each other's presence physically, we were really living separate lives. And while video conferencing technology has existed for some time, organizations have, by and large, chosen to have in-person, face-to-face meetings and events to make real connections, cementing this idea that technology acts as a barrier to relationship building and to make 'business' happen we need to look people in the eye and touch skin in a handshake or hug. The artificial barrier that the screen creates means that we lose our ability to feel a person's presence and therefore read the minor movements of their body that gives us an insight to their demeanour and supports us to understand their emotional state or communication purpose.

At the same time we know too that technology has acted as a link for those who might otherwise have been disconnected. Families reaching out to loved ones far from home via skype or businesses with global offices connecting their staff to build teams across regions and continents.


Rapid antigen tests arriving in countries to assist in COVID-19 response in the Americas



Legal Awareness for Health Workers

An emphasis on vertical health programs has left national health systems underdeveloped or crippled to deal with increasing incidences of pandemics, non-communicable diseases, antimicrobial resistance or benefit fully from technological advances. Further, current approaches to strengthening healthcare systems concentrates heavily on patient care and quality of services without sufficiently supporting and empowering health workers. Hence, health workers are viewed primarily as vehicles to be utilized to achieve these desired patient care results instead of stakeholders in the development of sustainable healthcare systems. This myopic view of patient care disjointed from the realities of healthcare workers leads to short term solutions and eventual failure of the healthcare system. <u>Read more</u>.




